Weekly meetings

The suggestion to hold an informal evening meeting once a month proved unsuccessful. The meetings where interesting speakers were invited were, however, successful.

Mary and Vincent Lenderink talked about a wine tasting fundraiser they organized for Flagler College. Charlotte Hesterman spoke about the plastic recycling company she founded with Lucky Luke Bastiaan.



Diane Thomas spoke about the foundation that supports family caregivers in Bonaire. Johan van Blerk talked about his foundation Terra Barra, which manages a botanical garden with the help of volunteers, grows local trees to reforest Bonaire and will start an education program for local goat farmers. Lizet Wolf presented a project for school students to get hands-on experience with a handyman to help people on Bonaire. Ronald Zwarter told an exceptionally well-attended meeting about the developments at the Dutch Caribbean Police Force. Harry

Somers gave a summary of the Thodé report on possible introduction of a social minimum for Bonaire. Wietze Koopman spoke about the October decisions of the House of Representatives to actually implement some of Thodé's proposals by 2024. Barbara Griot presented the program of the informal care week. Sylvia Dermout gave a presentation on the problem of Plastic Soup in the oceans. What is being done about it and what everyone can do to prevent it

from getting worse. Maurice



Adriaans talked about opportunities of agriculture on Bonaire and the role of LVV in it. Miles Mercera talked about tourism policy and the difficult process of opening new flight connections. Miranda Verburg and Pauline van der Loo presented the plans for children's playgrounds on Bonaire, part of which had already been realized. Elyane Nicolaas and Judette Frederiks told what the Council for Education and the Labor Market (ROA) is doing in collaboration with stakeholders to prevent that in 25 years, half of the workforce will be

low-skilled. Rochelle Heerema told about the Positive Mind Foundation's teaching kit to encourage reading among young people and using the books to talk about poverty issues. Evert Piar explained the activities of the Alzheimer's Foundation during District Governor Brian Glasgow's visit. Maarten van der Scheer presented the

future plans of our airport. And during the





very successful last Wednesday meeting of the year, on location in Rincon, Jan-Henk van der Wier talked about his project to revitalize Kas Schermer.



Fundraising

Through the Rotary Bonaire Foundation, RCB financially supports a variety of community causes. To make this possible, RCB also organized two major fundraising activities this year: the Rotarally and the Feria.



The day of the famous **Rotarally** turned out to coincide with the rainiest day of the year. Not deterred by the weather forecast, the rally committee nevertheless got 155 participants in 49 teams to the start. Especially the

route to the end point, the kunuku of Edison Rijna, required an adventurous spirit from the participants. The

pleasant afterglow for the participants who reached the end point, with a tasty meal and of course ice cold beer, wine and soda, provided an animated end to an exciting day. Thanks to this event, an amount of \$10.000 was made available for social causes.





For a long time it

looked like the **Feria** in 2024 would be limited in size. But thanks to a final offensive by the Feria committee, many items, even a lot of good-selling items, including a great catch from Corine at Harbour Village were collected in the last month.

The lack of a central storage facility created a tough logistical challenge this year. Thanks to the support of Napa, Rocargo and Balfran, the logistical puzzle was brought to a successful conclusion. With the efforts of all members present in

Bonaire and a

large group of volunteers from outside, the market was a great success. With the proceeds of \$22.500 came a substantial contribution to the Rotary fund. The foundation now has the financial room to support another major community project.

In addition to external fundraising, RCB also funds the Rotary Foundation through proceeds from raffles, which take place during each official meeting. In this board year, these raffles (including the TOD and Christmas raffle) raised a total of \$7.500.

All in all, \$40,000 was raised for charity this year.





Family Day



This fellowship promoting event also took place at the kunuku of Edison Rijna. Thanks to the good organization of the Family Day committee, this became a particularly enjoyable day. Not only for members, but also for their partners and children. The following Wednesday it turned out that everyone had survived the way home in one piece. Rotarians can withstand a bump.

Public relations

Both in newspapers and on the radio, RCB received considerable attention in this Rotary year. A total of 17 press releases went out about the change of board, about the Slagbaai Weekend, the Rally and the Feria, about the Paul Harris for André, about the financial support RCB gave to social causes on Bonaire and about the interesting presentations made during the lunch meetings.



Social goals

The Community Service Committee has not been idle this year. There were 11 applications received of which 3 applications for amounts over \$500. The following donations were granted after a positive recommendation from the CSC.
